Dedicated to the Memory of Late Professor (Dr.) M.S. Swaminathan

Who Killed the Swaminathan Committee Report?

Professor M S Swaminathan, widely recognized as the chief architect of green revolution in India passed away on September 2023 at the age of 98 years. Condolences poured in from different corners of the world remembering him as the most distinguished scientist and visionary who worked for the food security in India and also for his role in creation of the National Agricultural Research System in the country. In prof Swaminathan's passing away, India lost a great champion of the cause of agricultural development and farmers welfare. However, what is not properly highlighted is that Prof Swaminathan not only worked for increasing productivity by leveraging technology but also as chairman of the National Commission of Farmers – known as Swaminathan Commission – provided a detailed analysis of agrarian crisis and ways to overcome them. Professor Swaminathan firmly believed that agricultural and national development can not happen without protecting the rights and welfare of farmers. The National Commission on farmers headed by Professor Swaminathan submitted five volume reports during 2004-2006 which made incisive analysis of agrarian crises resulting in rise of farmers suicides and provided a comprehensive road map for all round development of agriculture and farmers welfare. The commission strongly advocated the need to combine agricultural growth with sustainable use of resources. The Swaminathan commission had advised the Government to raise the MSP (minimum support price) of agricultural produce to about 50% above the weighted cost of production to make it remunerative for farmers. Known as C2+50% formula it includes the input cost of capital and rent on the land (called C2) to give farmers 50% return. The report aimed to make agriculture a source of income and employment besides bringing about a comprehensive and sustainable shift in agriculture. The Swaminathan report was widely discussed in different forums throughout the country and was accepted on all hands that it is essential for imparting dynamism to agriculture, which will bring huge relief to the farmers as well as people who are related to agriculture.

The report became immensely popular among the farmers. The farmers, coordinated under numerous organizations demanded the implementation of recommendation of Swaminathan Commission report with immediate effect. If millions of farmers in India know only one English word, then it is 'Swaminathan Committee report'. Unfortunately, successive Governments sat on the report for many years and finally sent to cold storage. It was never discussed in the Parliament. Consecutive Governments promised that they would implement the report after coming to power; but after coming to power, they informed that these recommendations cannot be implemented as it would create distortion in the market. Lakhs of farmers were on the road demanding the execution of the report. Dr Swaminathan and other committee members prepared the report with hard labor and sincerity. Prof Swaminathan was apparently saddened seeing the fate of the report. Dr Swaminathan's vision of making the country self-sufficient in food grain production has been realized; but his wish to usher in stability in the livelihood of farmers remains a dream. Implementation of the Swaminathan commission would be the real tribute to the Agricultural Scientist's labour and achievement.

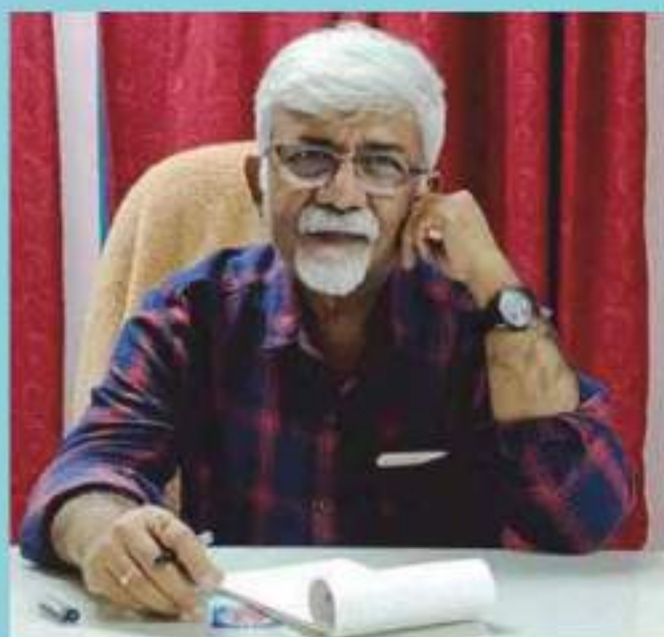

Research Thoughts

Genetically Modified Mustard - Who Gains? Neither Farmers, Nor Consumers

It's not my intention to kick start a controversy on GM Mustard but to disagree on the statement: "Ban on commercial release of GM crops against national interest". Most of us should believe, it may not. The 'national interest' in an agricultural country revolves round nurturing ecology, promoting biodiversity, maintaining pollinators, managing natural resources, improving crop productivity, **empowering farmers economically** and finally developing sustainable models using integrated farming systems, regenerative agriculture, organic farming in the line of present policy of the Government. That is what exactly being done, jointly by Tata Trusts, Gramin Development Services and Trust Community Livelihood in Uttar Pradesh and I am proud of being associated with such ground breaking Agricultural activities. The height of misguiding the Union Govt as well as Apex Court by stating that GM mustard will reduce the import of edible oil, that it is safe for the environment and human health, and is also safe for honeybees are worrying. It appears that policy makers have not been told about the irreversible threat to the environment, the farming community and public health from the release of GM mustard.

The fact remains, promotion of GM mustard in question is either at par or even lower yielding than present day normal hybrids. How come, India is likely to have self sufficiency in edible oil by cultivating GM mustard! Forget about other issues like irreversible threat to the environment, the farming community and public health from the release of GM mustard. The question: Do Indian farmers really need GM Mustard?

To answer it logically one has to examine the abiotic/biotic stress factors limiting mustard yields, the level of fluctuating production/productivity on yearly basis and finally how often the farmers are affected, economically. The facts and figures as available in public domain suggest that: The Global Rapeseeds-Mustard (R & M) output has almost become double from 36.0 million tonnes in 2001-02 to 70.0 million tonnes in 2013-14 and India contributed 11% of the total production ranking 4th largest producer in the world. Production trends over the past two decades indicated that there was a significant shift in production levels from about 5.0-6.0 million tonnes until 2002-03 to around 7.0-8.0 million tonnes during the past one decade. The jump in production was primarily on account of sharp

rise in yields besides significant expansion in area under R&M during the same period. The average productivity of R&M in India increased significantly from 850 kg/ha (2002-03) to the level of 1150 kg/ha (2012-13) which was unique among all oilseeds. This was possible due to excellent varietal developments through conventional breeding incorporating resistance/tolerance against frost, white rust, salinity, high temp., besides earliness, high oil and low erucic acid/glucosinolate. So, where is the pressing need to introduce GM Mustard, particularly when realizing higher productivity never posed much problem to farmers except under aberrant crop-weather condition? The ICAR/SAU and other NARS Scientists have successfully demonstrated the strength of good agronomic practices (GAP) that includes integrated pest management (IPM) technologies across major R&M growing states over years and showed the way to mop up additional 2.48 million tonnes of production annually with yield increase anywhere between 12-110% and appreciable cost benefit ratio (CBR). The average R&M productivity in the State like Gujarat has already touched around 1400 kg/ha. The problem in realizing much higher yields is the Zn deficiency that ranges from 21% (Rajasthan) to 60% (Haryana). A revolutionary increase in R&M production can be made simply by addressing micronutrient deficiencies, in the State namely Rajasthan which alone contributes 45% of the total production. Necessarily, the plea to introduce GM Mustard is certainly not in the interest of Indian farmers but to the best interest of influential business group backed by selected intellectuals. The hidden agenda could be to open the floodgate of GM in other food crops once the GM Mustard is approved!

Finally, the lobbyists for GM Mustard have not touched about consequences of direct uses of such mustard seeds in Indian curries as practiced widely; oil extracted in 'Kacchi Ghani' for original aroma/pungency and its traditional uses as massage oil to millions of babies in the countryside besides uses as bath oil in rural India. Apart from that, the consequences on the consumption of GM Mustard oil cake as feed and likely impact on fish, meat and milk are hardly known. India produces around 37.0 lakh tonnes mustard oil cake annually of which close to 28.0 lakh tonnes are consumed locally and 9.0 lakh tonnes are exported. No doubt, export of GM oil cake may be in jeopardy, particularly in European destinations. Thus, Indian interest is overshadowed while pushing GM Mustard backed by vested interest.

Commercial Release of GM Crops

Hon'ble Supreme Court Of India has said that the issue of genetically modified crops is a technical and Scientific matter and the Top Court will decide the plea against environmental release of GM Mustard, keeping in mind what is good for the country. It may be pertinent to mention that Government has approved only one GM crop Bt Cotton for commercial cultivation in 2002.

Indigenous Cattle

Cattle is the most prominent species of Indian Livestock with 36.04% share in Indian Livestock population. India possesses large repository of cattle genetic resource diversity with a population of 193.46 million as per 20th Livestock census, whereas Crossbred / exotic purebred cattle constitute around 51.36 million. The Annual milk yield in India in 2018-19 was 187.75 million tonnes (Mt), of which 48% is contributed by the cattle (**21% by the Indigenous cattle**). Annual yield per cow in India is 1642.9 kg against the global average of 2430.2 kg (FAO 2017). The per capita availability of milk is 394 g day⁻¹ and Punjab is at the top with an average availability of more than 1100 g. Apart from milk, Indian cattle also contribute towards draft power (30.77 million bullocks), and production of bio-manure, fuel, medicines and leather. Considering the importance of Indian breeds, continuous efforts are being made by Govt. of India and ICAR for the genetic improvement of indigenous cattle breeds through

various breed improvement programmes. In 2009, cattle genome was fully mapped.

Fish Breeding and Seed Production

Successful induced breeding of the Indian major carps in 1957 is considered as a revolutionary technology that has transformed the entire aquaculture sector to a vibrant enterprise, followed by the development of a sequel of activities, namely different hatchery technologies and models, beginning from earthen pits to the latest circular eco-hatchery model, ampouling of pituitary extract, refinement of breeding protocol, use of synthetic inducing agents, better broodstock management techniques, etc. With recent trends of species diversification, more specialized hatchery systems have been developed for seed production on a commercial-scale for different species of minor carps & barbs, catfishes (magur, striped catfish, pabda), freshwater prawn, murels, climbing perch, etc.
